Emergency:

FLOOD RELIEF OPERATION North Yorkshire Raynet

Rapidly melting snow combined with heavy rain resulted in a callout for RAYNET members in North Yorkshire when four rivers - the Tees, Swale, Ure and Nidd - rose to near record levels.

North Yorkshire County Council's emergency communications centre at County Hall, Northallerton, was opened at lunchtime on Tuesday, January 31 st, and the RAYNET county controller, Brian Dooks, G0RKI, was asked to provide radio operators.

The Richmond, Ryedale and Nidderdale groups were placed on standby and arrangements were made to staff the emergency centre overnight.

By early evening the River Tees overflowed its banks at Croft on the county boundary and police received reports that a road bridge had been swept away. G7HSN was sent to check. After establishing the bridge was still in place, he began monitoring the evacuation of homes.

Soon afterwards the River Swale flooded Catterick Village and a decision was taken to open an emergency rest centre in Allertonshire School, Northallerton. G4NUY was sent to obtain a situation report, while G0AWE set up a link from the rest centre to G0GCK and G7NKJ at County Hall.

As the situation deteriorated rapidly with main routes up Wensleydale and Swaledale blocked by floodwater, North Yorkshire Police were notified of a rail crash on the Settle-Carlisle line at Aisgill in which one person was killed.

RAYNET began planning a circuitous route to the remote location but were not needed.

Conditions became so bad on the Swale that coaches en route to the rest centre were unable to use two roads and were diverted south to cross the river before travelling north into Northallerton. The condition of the only usable bridge at Skipton-on-Swale, near Thirsk, was so important that G0UFI, G4HVA and G4FZN spent the next 18 hours covering shifts to report its availability to the emergency centre.

Some of the worst flooding was expected on the River Ure at Boroughbridge, which suffered badly in 1982 and 1991 when the water was 4 ft 6 ins deep in the town centre. Police placed 100 soldiers from 9 Regiment Army Air Corps on standby with 20 lorries, 12 Land Rovers and four Lynx helicopters.

Families were rescued from riverside homes in Ripon where the Ure peaked eight inches above its previous record level in 1991. G0RHI, who controlled a RAYNET flood relief operation at Boroughbridge in 1991, began sending reports from the market town at 3 am.

By daylight 20 homes in an area unprotected by the flood defences were 4 ft deep in water and the town could only be reached from the north via the A1. Four surrounding villages were cut off by a river up to a mile wide and a Lynx helicopter was sent to bring a pregnant woman to safety.

Mobiles using 2 metres could only work the 20 miles from Boroughbridge to the Northallerton emergency centre with difficulty. When G0RHI, G3EJF and G3JZP used hand helds around Boroughbridge they relayed via G3EKL (700ft ASL near Catterick Garrison) or G0PIR (520ft ASL west of Ripon).

Although the River Nidd can be controlled by regulating the output from three large reservoirs, part of the small town of Pateley Bridge was flooded. G4NUY was sent from the emergency centre with PMR equipment to provide a situation report from Upper Nidderdale relayed via G0PIR.

At Boroughbridge the Ure continued to rise - finally reaching its peak of 15.7 metres above ordnance datum at 3.30pm on Wednesday only one brick below the top of a flood defence wall alongside the river which was 350 yards wide at that point.

By then the stone-built three-arch bridge, which used to carry the A1 through the town, had been cleared in case it collapsed and the Army had sandbagged 200 yards of flood defence wall which looked in danger of being breached.

RAYNET returned to standby on Wednesday evening and were finally stood down at 1pm on Thursday after the combined volume of the Swale, Ure and Nidd had raised the level of the River Ouse - testing defences at York, Cawood and Selby.

North Yorkshire's emergency planning officer, Duncan Harvey, wrote to G0RHI: "I am most grateful for the immediate and effective response of North Yorkshire RAYNET. As the situation was developing it was difficult to obtain and then maintain an accurate picture.

"Your members helped to overcome these problems

and it is reassuring to know that we have a network of observers who can accurately report on the situation. I have the utmost confidence in RAYNET and your role and contribution are being noted with respect by the Police and the Fire Service."

Hospital:

SWITCHBOARD CHANGE - OVER

The Ayrshire RAYNET Group, with assistance from the Renfrewshire and Clyde Coast Groups, gave service to the Ayr Hospital, (the General Hospital serving Ayrshire) on 5th. February, following a request for help from Mrs. FAnson of the Hospital Trust. The hospital's main switchboard was due to be upgraded and it became obvious during discussions with BT and the firm carrying out the upgrade that links within the hospital and those with adjoining hospitals would be lost for a short time. Ayrshire RAYNET was invited to a meeting and it was decided that the work should be done at 02:00 hrs. on a Monday morning, a time expected to be quiet communications wise.

The group met at 01:00 hrs. and following a briefing from hospital staff and from the Group Controller, Tom Stewart, GM0BKX, the RAYNET members took up their positions at strategic positions in the main hospital and at the three other hospitals in the same group.

Needless to say, the timetable did not go exactly as planned as the firm carrying out the work came across a problem. Never-the-less, RAYNET worked through until the switchboard was re-connected and subsequently received a letter of thanks for another job well done.

Firstly he received a certificate of excellence in recognition of his performance during the 1994 VHF Field Day. He then received the "Goonie of the Contest" Award for "supplying the contest group with an extraordinary generator, supplying 318 volts AC on VHF Field Day 1994, which, when applied to the two metre radio station power supply, did cause it to explode its capacitors, causing shock and amazement to all in the radio operating tent, some of whom will never recover, others have recovered but will never be the same again, the shock being too much!"

The "new" Committee of Management held its first meeting in January and the members are now working hard to co-ordinate all RAYNET activities throughout the UK. At that meeting, presentations from the retiring Committee were made to the Past Chairman, Geoff Griffiths, G3STG and to Brian Tindill, G4HVA who stood down from the post of secretary on health grounds. Ian Jackson, G8RWH has taken on the post of Secretary, but Brian has agreed to continue as the Network's post-box at his Bedale address.

In the first phase of our drive to publicise our Organisation, priority has been given to enhance our standing in the fields of Emergency Planning, Training and Publicity. Each team now has a Director who will report on the work of the team at each Committee of Management meeting. Initial contact with the teams should, wherever possible, be through your own Zonal Co-ordinator.

It is very important that the User Services are kept as fully informed as possible about the advantages they can gain by using RAYNET. With this in mind, regular presentations are made to those members of the User Services who are responsible for Emergency Planning in their own organisations. On a National basis, about twelve presentations are made annually, and many more are made at a local level. A slide presentation, showing the work of the Radio Amateurs' Emergency Network, and which includes speaker's notes, is available to all Network Groups and can be booked through Tom Stewart, GMOBKX. Tom also handles the booking of the display photographs. The Network's publicity handout has been re-printed and copies are available from your Zonal Co-ordinator. These are particularly useful as handouts at meetings which are attended by User Services and other voluntary groups.

I welcome any moves which encourage groups which went "independent" to rejoin the National

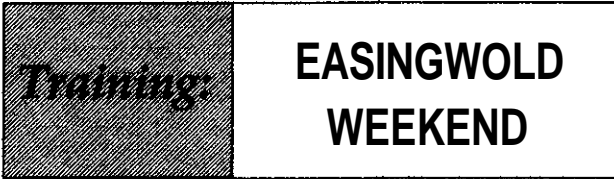
Network, and would ask that all groups, and all members in groups, take time to explain to members of Independent Groups the advantages to RAYNET as a whole, as well as to groups, of RAYNET being one National Network. To be credible, and effective, we must speak to the User Services and the other Voluntary Organisations as one voice, representing RAYNET throughout the UK. The Network will, of course, continue with this work, but it would be so much easier if we could, for example, pass on details and the results of our negotiations to everyone without having to go down two paths every time. If anyone has any suggestions which would lead to the independent groups rejoining us, please give me a ring on 0141-620 1000 any evening between 19:30 hrs. and 21:30 hrs. I will then put your ideas to the relevant team director, and ask them to follow up your suggestion. If I am not in, please leave a message with Katie, (GMOUIG), or on the answering machine. I will return your call at the first opportunity.

I was pleased to see how well the members of the Committee of Management are pulling together to move RAYNET on to providing an even better service both to our members and to the User Services. The new teams have been formed and will all be holding at least two team meetings before the next Committee of management Meeting. In the case of the teams which have members spread throughout the Country, the "meetings" will either be held by post, E Mail or telephone. One thing, however, is certain, a lot of work is being done, and will continue to be done by the teams. Progress to date has been, of necessity, slow, as we have worked to make new contacts and strengthen those already in existence. This approach is now paying off, and I anticipate that the Network will quickly take on an even stronger role in Emergency Communications.

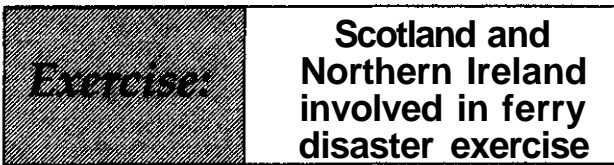

Following the very successful training co-ordinators' weekend at Easingwold which was held in November, there is another chance to attend when the event will be repeated during the weekend 2nd. to 4th. Exercise Beaufort's Dyke was a major air and sea rescue exercise held on Sunday 26th. February in the North Channel, Irish Sea. The Belfast freight ferry, MV Speroid, en route from Belfast to Stranraer, carrying 12 vehicles, 201 passengers and 18 crew, struck a partially submerged object. A disaster scenario then developed viz, fire on board, noxious fumes from vehicles on fire and pollution.

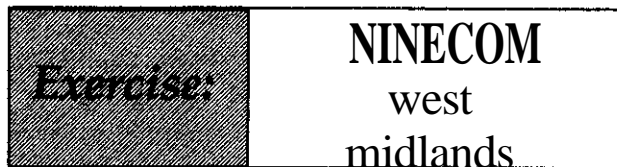
Subsequently 10 persons were known to be missing, and 200 passengers became affected by the smoke and fumes. In the ensuing panic a number of passengers were injured. The ship's Master declared a Mayday requiring evacuation of all passengers and non-essential crew. A full scale operation was triggered involving Search and Rescue helicopters and lifeboats from both Scotland and Northern Ireland. Northern Ireland Fire Brigade and Ambulance Services arranged for teams to be airlifted to the vessel to assist with fire fighting and medical treatment. Passing ships assisted with a surface search for persons who had abandoned the ship by life raft and for any who may have been in the water. The exercise, and subsequent air and sea rescue was organised and co-ordinated by HM Coastguard

from their Maritime Rescue Co-ordinating Centre at Greenock and their Maritime Rescue sub-centre at Belfast.

RAYNET groups, both Network and non-Network, from both Scotland and Northern Ireland, were co-ordinated by David MacKinnon, GM0ADF, Strathclyde Regional Controller. Some RAYNET operators manned all casualty landing sites and clearing stations in Scotland and Northern Ireland, while other RAYNET operators activated RAYNET positions at MRCC Clyde and MRSC Belfast passing casualty figures to HM Coastguard, and passing information on behalf of the exercise di-staff, through RAYNET control at Ayr.

The area of operation extended from Greenock, Strathclyde, to Bangor in Northern Ireland, and included areas in Dumfries and Galloway and the North Channel, Irish Sea. The radio engineering for the exercise was co-ordinated by Liam Harvey, GM4VYQ, group controller of South Argyll RAYNET.


The exercise provided an opportunity for many RAYNET groups to work together, providing a service to one of our User Services.



RAYNET in zone 9 were invited to take part in Exercise "Ninecom" on Friday 3rd. March. The objectives were to test contact arrangements, including pagers, to test the Home Office Emergency Communications Network, (ECN), to test BT lines, to test facsimile links and the test RAYNET links. It was held at the Region Nine County Emergency Centres (with the exception of the West Midlands) and included Hereford & Worcester, Shropshire, Staffordshire, Warwickshire and the West Midlands.

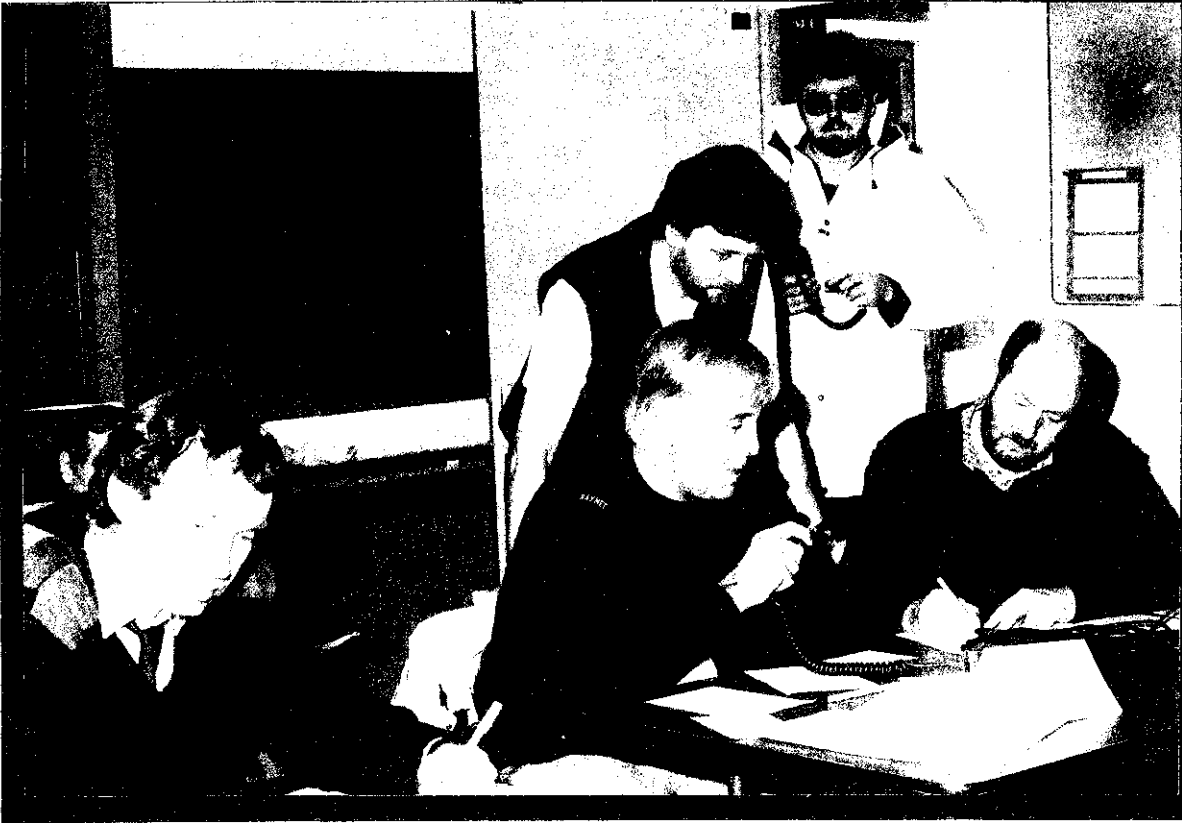

Committee of Management

Report of meeting 11th March 1995

A part from full reports from the Zones, discussion included reports on the progress made by the different specialist teams. March. Peter will commence his duties at the beginning of April. Full contact details for Peter are given on the order form which is included elsewhere in this issue.

Scottish Seminar

Fife RAYNET have, through their Regional Emergency Planning Officer, arranged a seminar for RAYNET during the weekend of 8th. and 9th. April. This will be held in South Queensferry, and will be financed by the Scottish Office, and by the Regional Emergency Planning Officers who will be sending delegates. It will be open to both Network and non-Network groups who have been invited by REPO's to send a controller delegate from each RAYNET group in their area, together with the Emergency Planning Officer responsible for Communications in their region.

The study will concentrate on developing the relationships and interfaces between local authorities, RAYNET and other agencies with the aim of improving liaison and co-ordination along with the provision of adequate training. The programme was compiled following consultation between local authorities, RAYNET and the Scottish Office, and will attempt to address issues arising from any major emergency with which RAYNET may be faced. Speakers at the meeting will include Ron Cowan, GM4SRL, National Chairman; Iain Strachan, GM4FLP, Zonal Co-ordinator, Scotland North; and Cathy Clark, G1GQJ Training Director.

RAYNET Pagers

Mercury Mini - Call

The Emergency Planning Team have negotiated special rates for the purchase of Mercury Mini Call Pagers by RAYNET individuals and groups. All services which are described as "UK Wide" refer to areas which are covered by Mercury paging. Prospective purchasers should check that the area required is covered. A coverage map is available. There is no ongoing rental charges, and, after the initial purchase, the only cost is for battery replacement and the cost of sending a message to the pager. With the Voicemail Service there is also a charge for retrieving messages. There are three services:-

1. The Message Call System. This is a tone only pager which will alert you, UK wide whenever a message is left on your voicemail service. The purchase price for RAYNET is £47.49.

2. The Lifestyle Plus. This is a numeric pager with the display on the top edge. The purchase price for RAYNET is £76.00

3. The Bravo Express. This is also a numeric pager with the display on the front face. A "silent vibrate" mode is standard with this pager and the pager has a back light, a clock, and time-stamps messages. The purchase price for RAYNET is £95.00.

Further details, and an order form, are available from David Seabrook, G6HPY, ZC4, the Director of Emergency Planning. As the Emergency Planning Team has worked hard on your behalf to negotiate these deals for members, please give the Network the chance of placing the order if you are considering purchasing a pager.
